College Bound Leadership Academies

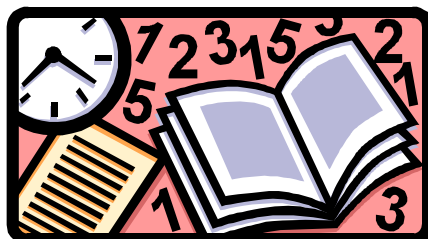
**Goleta Valley JHS Leadership Academy / June 20 – July 6, 2007**

# Summer Session 2007 – Course Descriptions

## Grades 9–12

Unless otherwise indicated, each high school course listed below is two hours long.  
The student will receive five credits for successfully completing a class.

### ART

#### ▶ Art, Freehand Drawing 1, 2

Freehand drawing is the foundation for all art classes. The course is designed to teach a variety of techniques using traditional art media including pencil, color pencil, charcoal, ink watercolor, oil pastel, and collage materials. Drawing from observation and imagination, students work with subject matter such as: portrait, landscape, still life, perspective, animals, fantasy, and individual ideas. Emphasis is on understanding light and shadow in value drawing, improving artistic skills, and personal creative exploration with subject matter and media.

**Location: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

#### ▶ Art, General

This course is the foundation of all art courses. It includes exploration of different techniques and methods of visual expression. Students engage in drawing, painting, and design projects.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

### BUSINESS EDUCATION

#### ▶ Computer Typing

Computer typing is designed to develop keyboarding skills and to handle various tasks as a typist and computer operator. Using computers, the course includes an introduction to word processing concepts which will help the student learn the fundamentals of editing, formatting, and printing.

**Location: Dos Pueblos High School**

### DRIVER EDUCATION

#### ▶ Driver Education Class

To provide information needed to become proficient, safe, knowledgeable drivers. This course is a prerequisite to Driver Training and must be passed before applying for the Provisional Driving Permit.

**Location: Dos Pueblos High School**

### ENGLISH

#### ▶ English 9, General

This course is a survey of communication skills and introduces the concepts of literary analysis. Reading includes poetry, short stories, novels, and plays, including one Shakespearean play.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

#### ▶ English 10, General

English 10 aims to provide a broad language arts curriculum that picks up from where ninth-grade English left off, carrying on with somewhat more challenging literature and emphasizing instruction in any array of specific writing modes.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

► **English Composition, Intermediate**

Writing instruction is built around a progression of models, instruction, and practice from both personal writing to analytical prose. Assignments offer practice with descriptive, narrative and expository writing and include autobiographical incident, reflective writing, generalizations supported by examples, interpretations, comparison/contrast, evaluation and persuasive writing. The course will also include instruction and exercises aimed at honing student skills with sentence structure, sentence variety, voice, tone, clarity, diction, and mechanics.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

► **English Skills, Basic**

*This class should be taken by students who need to pass the California High School Exit Exam.*

This course emphasizes the improvement of basic English skills in writing, reading, spelling, usage and simple analysis of literature.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

► **Reading For Success**

Reading For Success addresses word attack skills, phonemic relationships, reasoning and analysis skills, vocabulary development, and basic strategies for informational and academic reading. Students move from the beginning levels through complex critical thinking in analyzing arguments, organizing and utilizing information, and communicating information. Activities include recitation, reading-rate building, and workbook applications.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

**ENGLISH LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT (ELD)**

► **English Language Development 1, 2, 3**

These courses are designed for non-English speaking students. English Language Development (ELD) emphasizes listening skills, oral language development, writing, and reading of the English language.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

**FAMILY AND CONSUMER SCIENCE**

► **Health Science**

This course is required for graduation. The course provides students with information regarding health issues pertaining to teenagers. Course contents include adolescent stressors, stress management, self-esteem, eating disorders, suicides, substance use and abuse, communication techniques, decision-making skills, cancer, cardiovascular illnesses, infectious diseases, nutrition, exercising, parenting, pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, family planning, and sexual responsibility.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

**MATHEMATICS**

► **Algebra A**

This course is the first semester of a six-semester sequence and covers Chapters 1-4 of the Algebra 1-2 text.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

► **Algebra B**

This course is the second semester of a six-semester sequence designed to cover material in Algebra 1-2 and Geometry 1-2. This semester covers Chapters 5-8 of the Algebra 1-2 text.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

► **Algebra C**

Algebra C is the third semester of a 6-semester sequence designed to cover material in Algebra 1-2 and Geometry 1-2. This semester covers Chapters 9-12 of the Algebra 1-2 text.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

▶ **Algebra 1**

Algebra 1 is the first half of first year algebra. It is a course for study of variables, linear/quadratic equations and graphing with emphasis on writing algebraic equations from words, using ratios, and connecting algebra to other area of math and science.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

▶ **Algebra 2**

Algebra 2 is the second half of first year algebra as described above.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

▶ **Geometry A, B, C**

Geometry A, B, and C presents the regular Geometry 2 course at a slower pace so that more students can be exposed to higher math.

**Location: Dos Pueblos High School**

▶ **Geometry 1**

Geometry 1 is the first semester of a one-year course in plane geometry. Included topics are circles, construction and locus, areas and volumes and coordinate geometry. Proof is stressed.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

▶ **Geometry 2**

Geometry 2 is the second semester of a one-year course in plane geometry.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

▶ **Math Foundations**

This course covers fundamental arithmetic computation with application to real world problems.

California High School Exit Exam algebra will also be covered. This course is mainly for students who need preparation for the competency test and/or the exit exam.

**Location: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

## **SCIENCE**

▶ **Life Science 1**

*These courses do NOT meet college entrance requirements.*

Life Science 1 emphasizes the areas of human physiology, history of living organisms, survey of the animal kingdom, and ecology. Life Science provides a foundation for understanding the processes and conditions necessary for living. Life Science 2 is a continuation of Life Science 1, which provides a foundation for understanding the processes and conditions necessary for living. The course includes laboratory experience in using scientific methods and skills.

**Location: Dos Pueblos High School**

▶ **Earth Science 1, 2**

*These courses do NOT meet college entrance requirements.*

Earth Science is designed to provide the non-college preparatory student with a background in the more basic areas of earth science. The material will serve as a basis for further study in the earth sciences or it will offer a minimal understanding of the physical sciences for students who take no further classes in that area of science. Earth Science 2 is a continuance of Earth Science 1.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

▶ **Biology 1,2**

Living things and their relationship to one another and the environment. Includes survey of the biological Kingdoms, the human body, man's development, diseases, and heredity. Laboratory work includes microscope work, dissection and computer assignments. Satisfies university requirement for laboratory science. Biology 2 is a continuance of Biology 1.

**Location: Santa Barbara High School**

## **SOCIAL STUDIES**

### ▶ **Economics, Fundamental - REPEAT ONLY**

*This course does NOT meet college entrance requirements.*

This course is designed to help students understand their roles in a free enterprise system and give them a background in decision-making skills. The course will focus on basic economic principles, career development and an understanding of practical skills essential to daily living. Major topics covered are automobile insurance, banking, credit, taxes, advertising, budgeting, rights, jobs, habitability, and finance.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

### ▶ **U.S. Government, General - REPEAT ONLY**

*This course does NOT meet college entrance requirements.*

The course is designed to aid students in understanding how the political process operates in society. Political science attempts to determine how, and why, society divides its goods and services among its members. Emphasis will be placed on the structure and operation of the American political system, including a survey of political theory and the study of the unique aspects of the American system. Both the formal governmental operation and the informal influences such as political parties and pressure groups will be studied. Current political events will be examined as examples of the above processes.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

### ▶ **U.S. History 1, 2**

U.S. History 1 and 2 complete the American history sequence, which was taught in the fifth and eighth grades. It starts with a review of U.S. history from colonial times through the end of the nineteenth century. Areas of focus are: The Progressive Era, World War I, the Jazz Age, the Great Depression, World War II, the Cold War, hemispheric relationships in the Postwar Era, the Civil Rights Movement, American society in the Postwar Era, and the United States in recent times.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

### ▶ **World History 1, 2**

World History 1 and 2 complete the sequence of world history, which was taught in the sixth and seventh grades. It begins with a review of the major world civilizations and historical events from prehistoric man through the period of the Renaissance. The major areas of concentration are: the Industrial Revolution, the Rise of Imperialism, World War I, the Rise of Communism and Fascism, the causes and consequences of World War II, nationalism in the contemporary world, and unresolved problems of the modern world. Emphasis in the course is on the major political, economic, geographic, and cultural considerations that have shaped today's world and its people.

**Locations: Dos Pueblos and Santa Barbara high schools**

## **REGIONAL OCCUPATIONAL PROGRAM**

The Regional Occupational Program (ROP) is a system for providing occupational training classes, which supplement those classes offered by the local school district. ROP classes are offered and administered by the Santa Barbara County Education Office. Students interested in a ROP course should contact their counselor or ROP vocational advisor for more information and a registration form. This course is open entry/open exit, which means the student may begin the course at any time and finish upon the completion of the work. Credit will be assigned according to the number of class hours per semester (usually 10 credits). Transportation from a student's home school will be provided via MTD tokens for those unable to provide their own transportation.

### ▶ **ROP – Auto Body and Paint**

*Four-hour course, open to 11<sup>th</sup> grade students or those who are age 16+.*

This course provides students with the opportunity to gain skills in auto body and paint work under the direction of a skilled instructor.

**Location: Body Shop–Santa Barbara High School**

## Program Descriptions for Junior High Schools Summer Session 2007

La Cumbre, Goleta Valley, Santa Barbara junior high schools, as well as Community Day School will all be offering academic programs that focus on the skills necessary to be successful in high school and to pass the California High School Exit Exam. Tailored to the needs of students at each site, programs will support students in their educational goals while focusing on reading, writing, and mathematics. Credits toward promotion will be earned upon completion. Enrollment is limited; priority seating is given to those students who are deficient in promotional credits.
